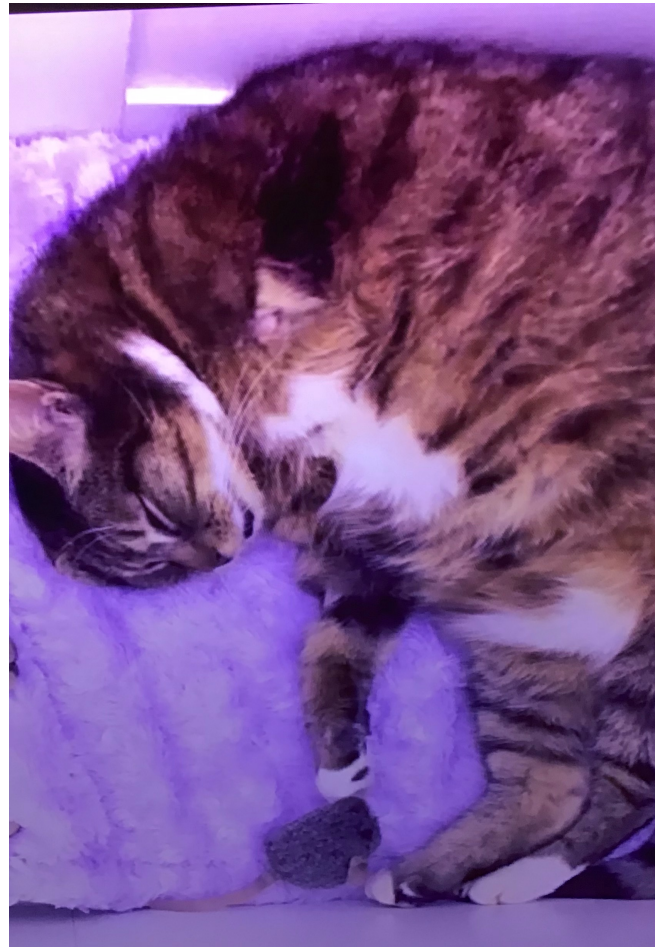


Image above - Harvey, dreaming of the natural disaster of 2016.
