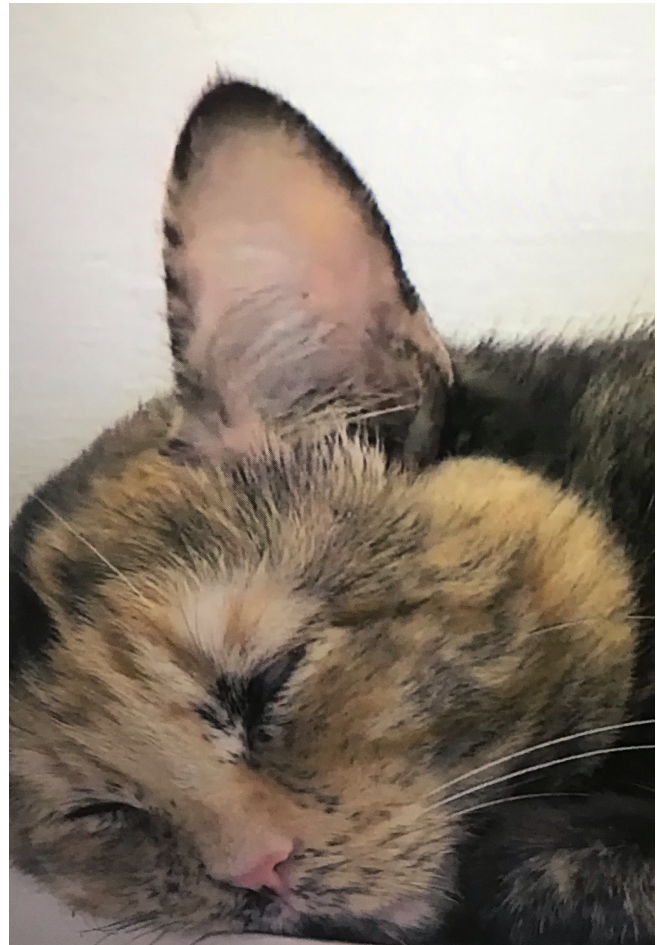


Image above - Judy,
