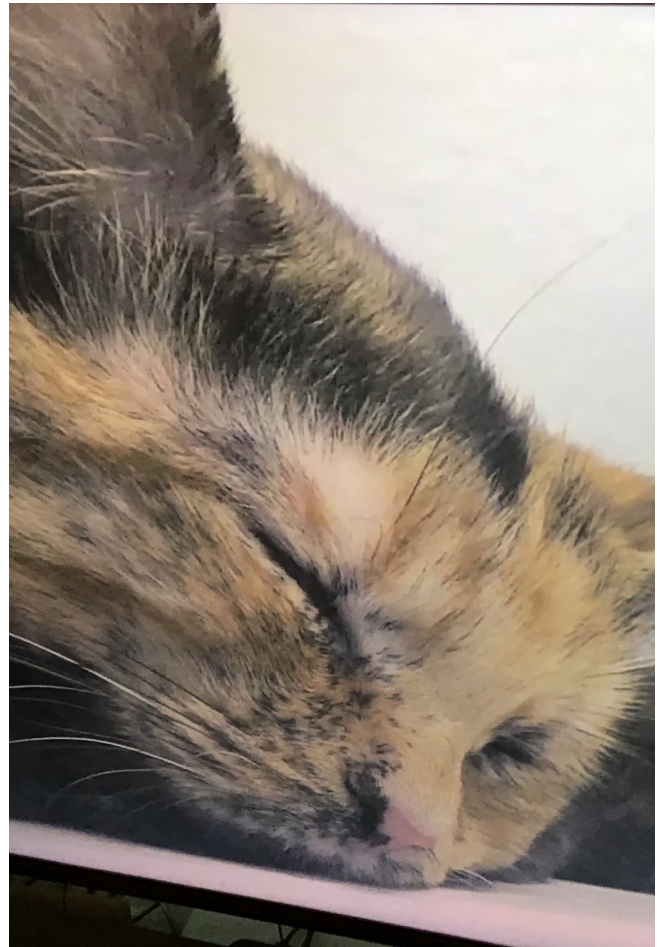


Image above - Judy, who doesn't care if her kittens play video games or not.
